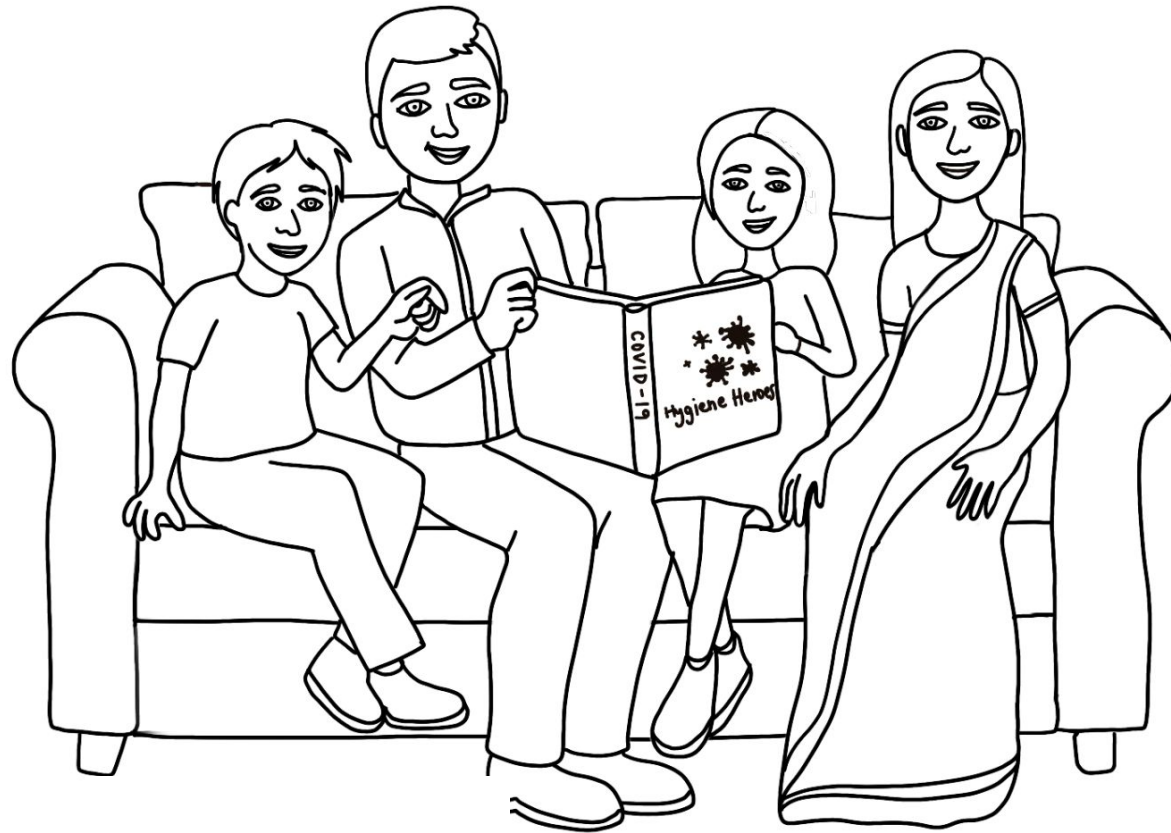


Coping with the COVID-19 Pandemic



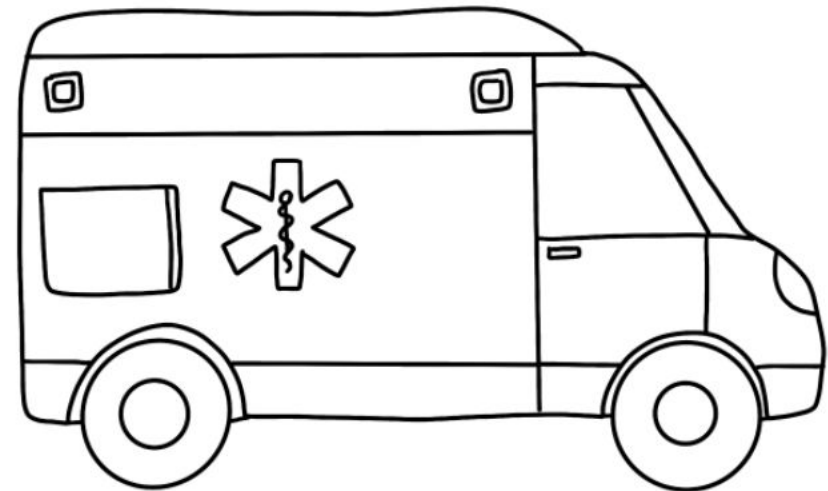
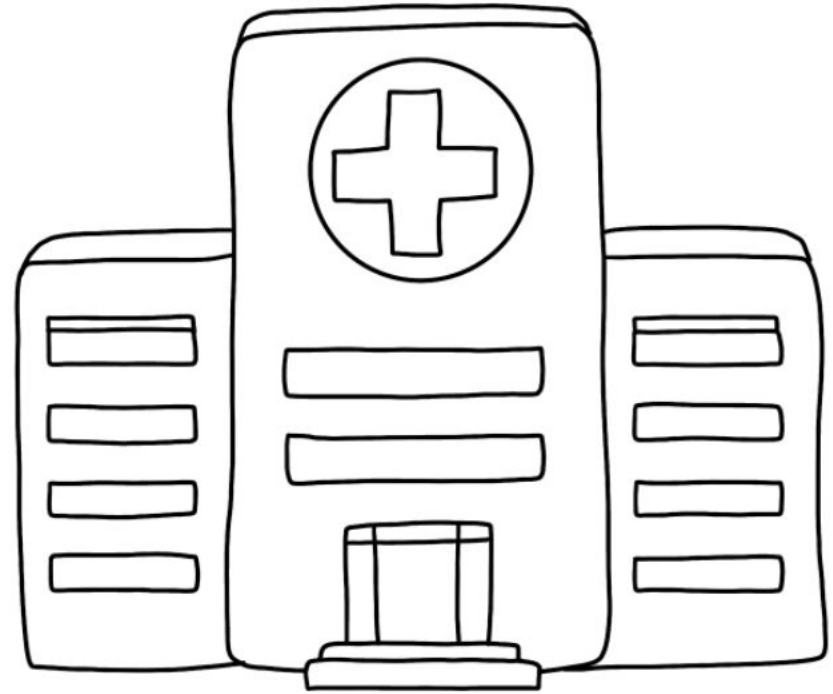
Asha and her family are learning about COVID-19.

Many adults could not work.



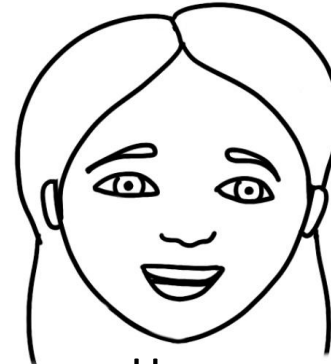
COVID-19 is scary.

Sad



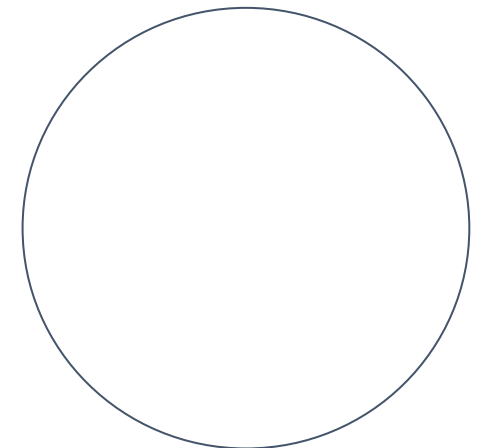
Mad

Scared

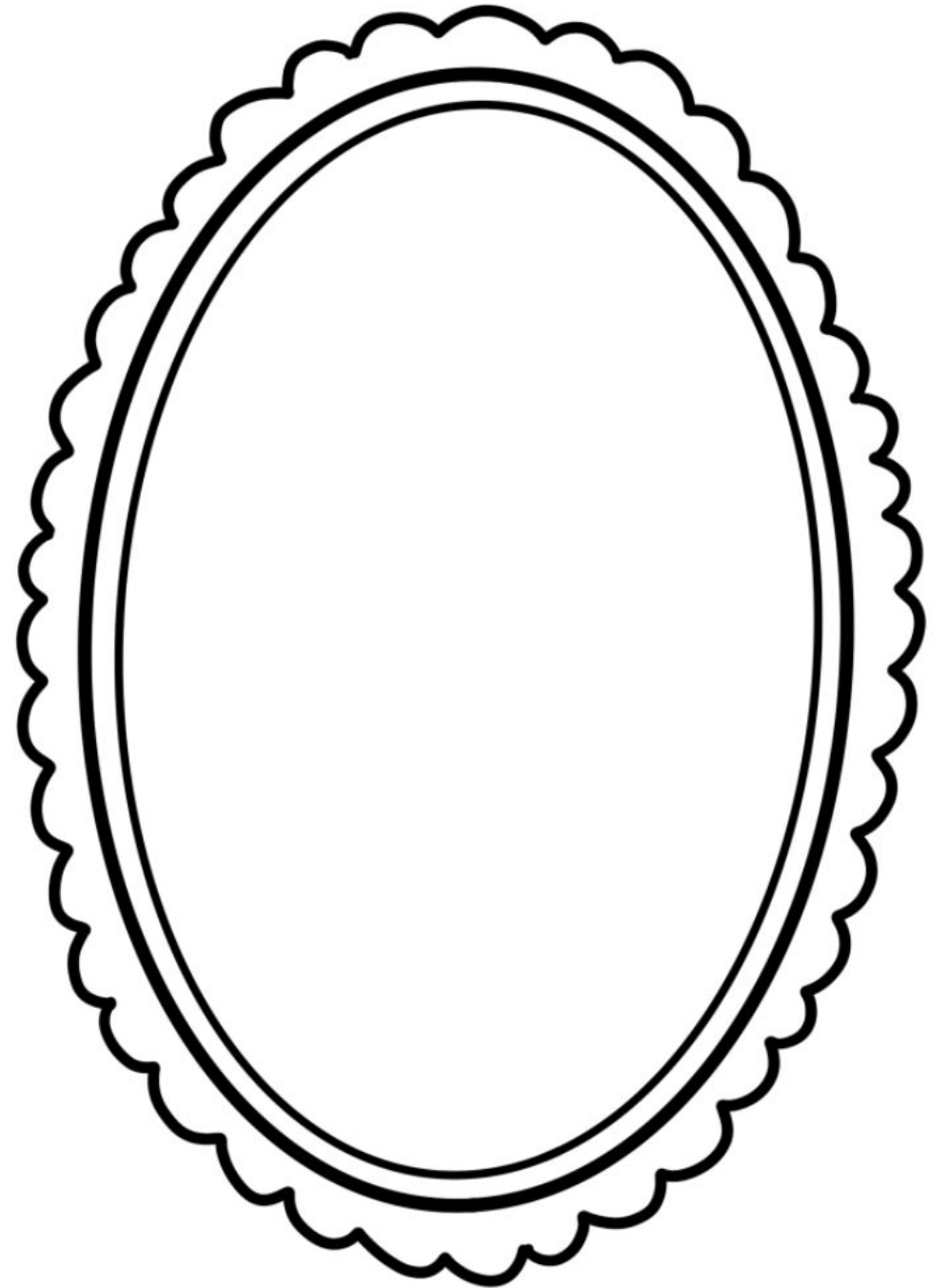


There are people around you
